Mr. Kiehn explained that the Needs Assessment provided a forum for parent input and advice to their school site with regard to services for English Learners. Mr. Kiehn concluded his report by reviewing some areas of concern for the coming year.

Ms. Doris Lowe, FBLA advisor at Redwood High School, as well as FBLA students present tonight, were asked to stand for recognition (Encl. No. 4). Redwood FBLA placed sixth overall at the FBLA State Leadership Conference held in Irvine, California. Over 125 schools and 1300 members attended the conference. Redwood FBLA was awarded the Dr. Jesse Graham Award, the most outstanding FBLA Chapter Award in California. Seven members of the group qualified to compete in five events at the National Leadership Conference scheduled for July in Denver, Colorado. Students were recognized for their individual achievements.

Ms. Lowe and newly elected Redwood FBLA Chapter President, Adrian Rodriguez, presented Board Clerk, Rodney Elder, with an honorary award for his ongoing support of the Redwood FBLA Chapter.

The Redwood Mock Trial Team and Advisor, Mike Tinnin, were recognized for having won numerous competitions here and at the state level. The team was composed of 13 members, seven of which had no previous mock trial experience. Twelve teams from Tulare County competed, and Redwood's team won all four rounds and defeated Tulare Western in the finals. This win qualified them for the State Mock Trial Competition held in Santa Ana, California. At the state competition, Redwood won two rounds and competed against the returning champions. Following the students' recognition, the Mock Trial Team presented Mr. Leppek with a giant gavel they had won.

Mrs. Libby Romani, Lead Teacher, Elementary Music Team, reported that Mr. Phil Barker had talked with her in the fall and asked if it would be possible for the sixth grade band students to participate in the California Music Educators Association Festival in March (Encl. No. 6). The festival is an adjudicated performance with groups from Kings and Tulare Counties. Mrs. Romani called the representative in Fresno and arranged for the sixth graders to participate in the festival. Mr. Barker and Mr. Robert Hinds got the Royal Oaks, Highland and Willow Glen sixth grade bands together for the competition. Mr. Barker explained that in the competition a #1 is the highest rating and that to receive a superior rating, it takes two #1's. This sixth grade band was one of only three bands in Tulare County to receive all #1's from all of the judges. To thank their respective principals, Mrs. Parker, Mr. Cardoza and Mrs. Nave for supporting them in their efforts, the students had copies of their superior certificates prepared, matted and signed by each of the students.

VUTA President, Karl Kildow, asked the teachers in the audience to stand for recognition. Mr. Kildow reported on his meeting with valley legislators in Sacramento this past week. He also told the board that he had sent each of them and district staff information via e-mail regarding Mr. Jim Schlotz' findings, which he said differed from Mr. Gröeber's calculations, regarding the +2 Golden Handshake retirement incentive. Mr. Kildow also said that when he was in Sacramento he walked a picket line with SBC workers in response to their employers asking for cuts in their health insurance benefits. Mr. Kildow expressed his appreciation of the work that teachers do and shared his concern that as demands continue to be put upon them, their personal lives, health and their students will be adversely affected. He concluded by saying that if we do not get a handle on this "assault" issue, he sees a collapse coming in the educational system.

Katy Rominger, a district teacher, asked the board to take a look at the work that Mr. Schlotz had done on the retirement incentive. She then expressed her concerns relative to what she sees as “segregation” in district classrooms.

Mr. Mike Woodbury, a parent who had spoken at a previous board meeting regarding the recent high speed car chase through the district and what he felt was the need to have had a lockdown at our schools, asked what the board had decided to do with regard to a policy in dealing with this type of event. Mr. Carrizosa responded that immediately upon the conclusion of the first high speed chase that we encountered in our district and following a thorough debriefing of the information gathered, the district instituted an administrative regulation that anytime a high speed chase occurs within our district, all schools will go on a lockdown.

Several parents came forward to address the board concerning PE credit in Dance for 9th grade students counting toward graduation requirements. The board asked if staff was ready to address the work they had been doing on this policy since the discussion at the May 11 board meeting. As staff was prepared, they will review the findings of the committee regarding PE as it comes up for discussion later on tonight’s agenda.

UPDATE**

Robert Gröeber updated the board members on what was included in the Governor’s May Revise and how it affects the district budget (Encl. No. 7). He spoke of where the state was when Governor Schwarzenegger took office in January and the number of things the Governor has been able to accomplish in this short period of time. Mr. Gröeber gave an overview of the May Revision, highlighting what is in the education budget and what is not included in the budget. Mr. Gröeber reported that for 2004-05, the district will see a 3.32 percent net increase from 2003-04 in COLA and deficit reduction over our current revenue limit. The statutory deadline for the legislature to pass their budget bill is June 15, and it is the Governor’s responsibility to sign the budget by June 30, 2004.

Enclosure No. 8 was a resolution recommended for board adoption to support HR 594 and SB349 to repeal the Government Pension Offset and the Windfall Elimination Provisions included in the Social Security System (Encl. No. 8). Mr. Carl Switzer, representing Division 40 of the Tulare County Retired Teachers Association, explained how the current system penalizes certain state employees by significantly reducing or eliminating Social Security benefits they had earned prior to becoming a teacher/fireman/policeman. Terese Lane, a teacher at Redwood, also spoke in support of repealing the Government Pension Offset and the Windfall Elimination Provision. Following Mr. Carrizosa reading the resolution, on a motion by Jones and second by Stephenson, the board approved the resolution supporting the immediate repeal of the GPO and the WEP penalties incorporated in the Social Security System. Mr. Belmana reported that Redwood had their recognition barbeque with approximately 700 students attending, held their yearbook signing last Friday, and successfully completed their “Locks of Love” event and the boys tennis team will go on to play for the valley championship tomorrow against Stockdale at the Visalia Racquet Club at 3 p.m.; Golden West will have its Link Crew training tomorrow morning for next year’s new members, will be having their yearbook signing soon, and are having their Associated Student Body meeting for next year’s ASB students; El Diamante students are having their yearbook signing this Thursday, have been

having campus bands play during lunchtime, their Journalism Department sponsored the “Halfway There” sophomore barbeque recently, Mr. Jon Awbrey has been named the new Activities Director at El Diamante, and the school will begin having class officers. Mr. Belmana announced the names of district students who won the Pinnacle Award this past Saturday at the Tulare County Video Festival. Also, Xavier Barajas was the first player in Visalia to win the Boys Tennis Championship. Mt. Whitney seniors enjoyed Grad Night, held their senior slide show and barbeque last Thursday, their farewell assembly will be this Thursday and finals are starting this Friday through next week. Mr. Belmana said that all seniors in the district are anxious for graduation next week. In conclusion, he said that it has been an honor representing Mt. Whitney and thanked the board for the Certificate of Appreciation.

Board members reported on attending several events during the past couple of weeks. Among the events were the Association of Mexican American Educator’s Scholarship and Recognition Night Dinner, a recent meeting with Pop Warner to work through some logistical issues, a credential meeting with the Tulare County Workforce Investment Board, Open Houses at Highland and Elbow Creek, Mt. Whitney’s Portfolio Day, chaperoning Grad Night with Golden West High School, Multi-Cultural Day at Visalia Adult School, the dedication of the multi-purpose buildings at Green Acres and Divisadero Middle Schools, a district retirement reception where approximately 44 retirees, representing close to 1,000 years of service, were honored, the FBLA Annual Banquet at Redwood last week, and the Visalia Education Foundation meeting yesterday. Mr. Guerrero asked that staff follow up on Mrs. Rominger’s concerns. Mr. Jones commended the sixth grade band students on their achievements and expressed his continuing support of the district’s music program. Mrs. Martin commended Rosemary Perez for the work she has done through the years on Portfolio Day at Mt. Whitney. Mr. Elder commended all of the students being recognized tonight. He also congratulated Mr. Leppek on his retirement and thanked him for his many years in the district. Mr. Carrizosa reminded the board of the upcoming graduation ceremonies in the district. He also recognized and thanked Scott Smith and Russ Audino for last weekend’s first annual Visalia Video Film Festival, where approximately 500-600 people filled the bottom level of the Fox Theater. He said that VUSD high schools were very well represented at the event and that they had earned awards in the competition. In conclusion, Mr. Carrizosa congratulated Xavier Barajas, a family friend, on his recent success in winning the valley championship in tennis, El Diamante’s first varsity level championship.

**HIGH SCHOOL
GRADUATION

PROCESS**

Mrs. Lambert and Mrs. Curschman reported on the process that staff used to look at all of our current graduation requirements and determine any recommendations that would be made to the board (Encl. No. 14). Beginning in November 2003, site and district staff began a very extensive process of examining the graduation requirements and looking at the recommendations from the 2001-2002 Graduation Committee. The present committee worked to create viable plans to provide an appropriately rigorous course of study for every student and one that addresses what every student should know and be able to do upon completing their education

in VUSD. The goal of the committee was to successfully implement recommendations that would reflect the foundational belief that “every student is capable and entitled to equity in opportunities in our high schools.” The recommendation from the high school subcommittee was that beginning with the graduating class of 2008, all students in the district will be required to complete four years (40 units) of English instruction. Mrs. Curschman reviewed the findings which lead the team to make the recommendation.

Public Comment on this topic was opened. Mrs. Bea Soxman said that it is the goal of the district Vocational Education staff to provide its students with the full benefit of a rigorous and thorough education. She referred everyone to Page 7 of the enclosure and said that under Vocational Education and Alignment to Standards, under Recommendations, that English classes taught in the four partnership academies are standards-based and do provide the core content. Mrs. Soxman shared her concern about vocational education classes when students have been given additional requirements along with the CAHSEE which students are now required to pass in order to graduate. She said that we need to ensure that our students are making the best of their efforts while they are in high school.

A copy of the Physical Education Proposal was provided to the board and audience. Mrs. Lambert reviewed the process used by the Impact Study Team to develop the recommendation regarding PE requirements for graduation. The 2002 committee’s recommendation was to maintain the 20-unit graduation requirement for Physical Education and mandate that all freshmen enroll in PE, which would mean the elimination of exemptions for 9th grade students. Mrs. Lambert also reviewed the findings of the team leading to the current recommendation that beginning with the graduating class of 2009, all students in the Visalia Unified School District will be required to enroll in a Physical Education class in the 9th grade as part of the requirements for graduation from high school. Mrs. Curschman explained the rationale for the recommendation and explained the difference between an exemption for inter-scholastic sports and a replacement class. The PE course outlines will be available on the district website beginning July 1 as they will be in place for next year. Mrs. Curschman said that the implementation of the new course outlines will enhance the rigor of all PE courses and added that there are now specific PE standards for 9th grade students and specific standards for students in grades 10, 11 and 12. Effective July 2007, Education Code regulations will require that 10th, 11th and 12th grade students who have failed to pass the state physical fitness test be enrolled in PE courses. Mr. Drew Sorensen, who also served on the impact team, reviewed several other reasons for the team’s PE recommendation.

Mrs. Lambert explained that Beginning Dance is an entry level class. She said that it is not necessarily that the class is not physical enough, but that it does not meet all of the components of what a 9th grade core PE class should have. Mrs. Lambert said that the committee discussed, and that the board may want to consider, that since the Advanced Dance class is core specific, not grade specific, that the district might offer a replacement class for Advanced Dance, no matter what grade level the student is in, if they can meet the requirements for the class.

Board members continued a lengthy discussion regarding the Physical Education recommendation, particularly regarding Dance. They emphasized the importance of our students being physically fit, as well as mentally fit and the need for the district to offer Physical

Education and sports programs that students enjoy and want to stay involved in. Mr. Guerrero asked staff to find out the number of students currently enrolled in the Dance Programs, their grade levels, gender and schools where they are enrolled. Mr. Carrizosa clarified that currently a 9th grade student cannot get PE credit, even in an Advanced Dance class because our requirement is, unless you have a waiver for a sport, you must be enrolled in a core PE program.
